San Mateo County Transit District

Transit District is the administrative body for three (and a half) agencies: SamTrans, Transportation Authority, and Caltrain

San Mateo County TRANSIT DISTRICT

Role of the San Mateo County Transportation Authority (TA)

- Advocate and/or apply for funding at federal, state, and regional levels to leverage TA investments
- Sponsor Highway Projects of Countywide Significance
- Partner with MTC, C/CAG, Caltrans and local jurisdictions
- Provide technical assistance and manage projects on behalf of local jurisdictions



Measure A generates approx. **\$100 million** annually. Measure W generates approx. **\$50 million** annually for the TA. Half of Measure W funds are administered directly by SamTrans - for an additional **\$50 million** annually.











Reconnecting Communities: Connect4SSF

- TA—in collaboration with South San Francisco and OneShoreline—awarded a *Reconnecting Communities: Highways to Boulevards* grant from Caltrans
- Funding will be split between agencies across the state
- Bicycle, pedestrian and transit improvements along SR 82 (El Camino Real), Colma Creek, and other local priority corridors
- Will benefit underserved communities and strengthen connections between transit and housing, jobs and open space















Call for Projects

Pedestrian & Bicycle

- Approx \$19 million available for Cycle 7
- Large Capital Projects, Small Capital/Quick Build Projects, Planning & Promotions, Safe Routes to School

Alternative Congestion Relief & Transportation Demand Management (ACR/TDM)

- Approx \$6 million available for Cycle 2
- ITS Planning & Design, TDM Competitive Projects, TDM Planning

Key Dates (both programs):

- Release of CFPs June 10
- Applications Due August 30
- Expected Awards December 5











Proposes to create a dedicated managed lane connection between SR 92 and 101 Express Lanes.

Project Goals

- Improve the travel time reliability for those traveling between US 101 and SR 92, east of US 101
- Encourage carpooling and the use of shuttles and buses to increase the number of people moved
- Improve the operational efficiency of the US 101 and SR 92 interchange

3 build alternatives, one no-build option















Build Alternative 1: *Direct Connector from Westbound SR 92 to the US 101 Express Lanes*

- Would provide a direct connection from westbound 92 to both directions of 101 Express Lanes
- Benefiting morning commuters















Build Alternative 2: *Reversible Direct Connector Between US 101 Express Lanes and SR 92*

- Would provide a direct connection between
 92 and 101 Express Lanes
- Connector would be a reversible lane
- Allow access from westbound 92 to 101 Express Lanes during morning commute hours, and then switch to allow access from 101 Express Lanes to eastbound 92 during evening commute hours













Build Alternative 3: *Direct Connector from the US 101 Express Lanes to Eastbound SR 92*

- Would provide a direct connection from the 101 Express Lanes to EB 92 to serve traffic heading to the Hayward-San Mateo Bridge
- Would provide access from the express lanes on 101 to EB 92 without requiring a lane change
- Benefiting evening commuters





























TA Technical Assistance: ECR Complete Streets

- The TA can provide technical assistance and manage projects on behalf of local jurisdictions
- The Town of Atherton is studying a 1.5mile segment of El Camino Real (State Route 82) from Selby Lane to Valparaiso Avenue
- The lack of pedestrian facilities makes it difficult to walk along El Camino Real and to access transit
- Survey is currently open from now through mid-June

The SamTrans System

- Operates fixed bus routes, Ride Plus microtransit service, and RediWheels for people with mobility challenges throughout San Mateo County and into parts of San Francisco and Palo Alto
- 300+ bus fleet; 30,000 weekday ridership

samīrans

- Fixed route service currently at 87% of pre-pandemic ridership
- High need, transit dependent customer base:
 - 90% of riders are low income, 64% extremely low income*
 - $\circ~$ Nearly 75% do not have access to a car
- Implementation of Reimagine SamTrans began in August 2022 and will wrap up in Summer 2024

*Based on San Mateo County Affordable Housing Index levels

Reimagine Phase 4

Fourth and final phase of *Reimagine SamTrans* implementation takes effect August 4, 2024

samīrans

- After implementation, SamTrans' network will have:
 - Approximately 12% increase in in-service hours compared to *pre-Reimagine SamTrans* (Jan 2019)
 - Approximately 15% increase in District
 operator workforce
 - The improvements coming in August 2024 include:
- More frequent service on weekdays, including the midday period, on seven routes
- More frequent or new service on weekends on eight routes
- Two brand new routes to San Mateo County community colleges and reintroducing Route 118





Reimagine Phase 4

SamTrans is also considering some modifications from original adopted Reimagine SamTrans to: **Routes 120, 121, 249 (new route), 278, 296/296 Owl, 292, 397, FCX, EPX, and 85**

Public comment period ran from April 19 to May 10th and included:

- Dedicated webpage
- Multilingual survey; feedback could also be provided via email address, and customer service line
- Multilingual take-one pamphlets on the buses
- Press release and social media posts
- Targeted outreach
- Two opportunities for public comments at meetings: April 24 CAC meeting and May 1 Board meeting
